Chinatown

Gerrard Street and Macclesfield Street, Soho, W1

the Chinese community moved from the Limehouse area of East London to this community in the 1960s and 70s. Here you will find Chinese family shops and plenty of restaurants. The street signs are in English and Chinese and as you would expect there is colourful street entertainment especially at the Chinese New Year (late January/early February)

this is the largest castle in England and is the oldest royal residence to have remained in constant use by reigning monarchs. Well worth a visit it has a lovely collection of Chinese porcelain in the King's Drawing Room

the TT Tsui Gallery of Chinese Art covers items dating from 3000BC. Displayed according to use the artefacts look at Chinese ways of life, eating, burial, The Court and

temple worship and include textiles, porcelain and furniture. Every dynasty is illustrated: the Han dynasty (206BC-AD220) has tomb paintings, reliefs and jade funeral items; the Tang (618-906) tomb carvings (camels & horses), silver & gold receptacles, jars and white porcelain; the Song (960-1278) ceramics and embroidered ritual robes; the Yuan (1279-1368) paintings and ceramics; the Ming (1368-1644) furniture including a 1650 canopied bed, writing mats, silk textiles and tapestries; the Quig (1644-1911) goods specially manufactured for European markets. The Gallery is the first one in Britain to have labelling in two languages - English and Chinese

the Gerard Godfrey Gallery of Chinese Export Art is a special collection of goods in porcelain, wood and ivory that appealed to European taste and were made by the Chinese solely for export

Cadiz Memorial

this cast iron French mortar mounted on Chinese dragons was constructed in the Royal Arsenal, Woolwich in 1814. It was presented by the Spanish government "to commemorate the raising of the siege of Cadiz in consequence of the glorious victory gained by the Duke of Wellington over the French at Salamanca on 22 July MDCCCXII "

Royal Marines Memorial

Admiralty Arch, The Mall, SW1

this 1903 war memorial by Captain Adrian Jones was originally erected to commemorate those who died between 1899 and 1900 in the Boer and China Wars. In 2000 it was refurbished as a memorial to all conflicts in which the Royal Marines had been involved. The relief by Sir Thomas Graham Jackson shows various battles in the original South African and China campaigns

General Charles George Gordon

near the Ministry of Defence, Whitehall, SW1

this statue of 1887 shows 'Chinese Gordon' (1833-85) with a cane under his arm and a bible in his hand. Having fought in the Crimean War (1855-6) he then crushed the Taiping Rebellion in China in 1860 (that's where he got his nickname). In 1884 he was besieged at Khartoum for 10 months by the Mahdi's troops and died two days before the relief force arrived

The collection exists to promote the appreciation, study and teaching of the art and culture of China and the surrounding regions and the library is devoted to both Western and Eastern Asian books on the subject

the private home of Lady Katherine Binning between 1936 and 1956 bequeathed to the National Trust. She inherited furniture, pictures and 18th century porcelain from her uncle, the collector George Salting and continued adding to the collection. There is porcelain from British factories such as Chelsea, Bow, Worcester, Bristol and Plymouth and from oriental factories including some early white and blue Chinese

here amongst one of the greatest national collections in the world you will find Chinese vases from the Ming period 1368-1644: one of blue and white porcelain with floral and avian decorations, another of copper-red depicting flowers of each month. There are also statues, art, snuffboxes, porcelain (Ming, Yuan, Ru, Song dynasties), money, bronzes, jades, ceramics, tombs, silver - a treasure trove of Chinese art and craft
