a statue of 1983 commemorates Earl Mountbattan (1900-79), Admiral of the Fleet, statesman and grandson of Queen Victoria. During the 2nd World War he was supreme commander in SE Asia and defeated the Japanese offensive into India in 1944. In 1947 he became the last Viceroy of India prior to independence. He was assassinated by Irish terrorists while fishing off Ireland. The statue is by Fanta Belsky

Robert, 1st Baron Clive of Plassey,

Marquis Curzon (1859-1925) was a British statesman who became Viceroy of India (1898) where he introduced social & political reforms, established the North West Frontier Province and partitioned Bengal. His home was No.1 Carlton Terrace. The statue is by Sir Bertram Mackennal

Frederick Sleigh, 1st Earl Roberts of Kandahar, Pretoria and Waterford

Horse Guards Parade, SW1

this statue of 1924 commemorates the 1st Earl Roberts (1832-1914). A British field marshal he became commander-in-chief in India (1885-93). By Henry Bates this is a smaller version of a statue in Calcutta

in an area nicknamed 'Little India' and dominated by Asian shops and restaurants, a local cinema showing 'bollywood' films and many of the population dressed in turbans or sari, this Asian pub has a larger than life model of an Asian in traditional dress on the outside. It also is the first, if not the only pub, to accept payment in rupees. Worth visiting if you enjoy Asian music as a live band plays very evening Thursday to Saturday

John Frederick Horniman, a tea magnate, enjoyed collecting ethnographic material. He built the museum in 1901 as a 'gift to the people of London' after holding a number of successful private viewings. The collection includes 32,000 items from Asia especially carving (masks and puppets), stone sculpture (including archways and doors), ritual objects, costumes and musical instruments, all depicting the culture of India, China, Japan, Sri Lanka & Burma

one of the curatorial departments of the museum covers Indian and South-East Asia. Among the many treasures in the Nehru Gallery of Indian Art are examples of Indian arms and armour, buddha sculpture, jewellery, textiles (especially chintz and muslim), furniture, metalworking and paintings. Have a look at Tippoo's Tiger (a life size automaton in wood of a tiger mauling an officer of the East India Co); basalt sculptures and copper artefacts from India and Nepal; a golden chair belonging to Ranjit Singh, the last Sikh emperor; a brooch & sword of the Sultan of Mysore (killed by the British 1799); and a white nephrite-jade wine cup in the shape of a shell made for Mogul emperor Shah Jahan; and this is only a handful of the treasures held

Statue by Baron Carlo Marochetti, 1867, shows him with a wereath on his head holding a sword and olive branch. Beside him is a figure sitting on a lion

Behind are 2 females symbolising Asia (with camel) and Africa (with lion). On the right is the River God (the Thames) and in the background ships are going to sea; by John Michael Rysback

throughout the Office there are portrait busts by Matthew Digby Wyatt portraying great figures in Anglo-Indian history and names of Indian provinces and cities

in the Main Quadrangle female figures represent diplomatic relations between countries in the 1860s; different races of India and continents of the world; further female figures with emblem shields depict the major cities of the United Kingdom.

On it are listed the regiments of Ghurkha rifles whose men gave their lives, together with a list of campaigns from India in 1816 to Bosnia in 1996. It is inscribed 'bravest of the brave, most generous of the generous, never had country more faithful friends than you'

This is the crest of Nalanda with other Buddhist symbols Nalanda was a great monastic university of India in the time of Buddha and as the crest has been used by other monastic institutions it is an appropriate symbol for a teaching institution
