the original Jacobean mantelpiece has a biblical scene from the Old Testament of the Angel stopping Abraham from sacrificing Isaac

Lancaster House

opening: usually by invitation only as this lovely house is used by the government and diplomatic service for conferences and entertaining heads of state, politicians and other celebrities. If you do have the chance to see inside you will find very beautiful, richly decorated historic rooms - make the most of the opportunity!

among the lovely ceilings in this 1820's house, that in the State Drawing Room shows St Grisogonos being borne to heaven by angels. By Guercino it is based on the painting in the church at Trastevere in Rome

Westminster Hall

built in 1394 and surviving fires and wars, this Hall is one of the finest and largest medieval halls in Europe. It has a magnificent hammerbeam roof rising to 90 feet at the crest and the supporting beams are carved with flying angels

amongst the collection of Celtic, Saxon and Tudor coins are seven 'angel' gold coins of King Henry VIII. They show the archangel St Michael defeating the Devil

London County Council School Memorial

Poplar Recreation Ground, between Hale Street and Woodstock Terrace, E14

transport: All Saints & Poplar DLR; buses 15,D6

standing in this recreation ground is a 1919 Sicilian marble and Aberdeen granite gothic obelisk topped with an angel. It is a memorial to the 18 5-year old children of

a nearby school that were killed by a bomb in the 1st World War (1917)

*Westminster Hall was built in 1099 and its carved
hammerbeam roof complete with angels was added by
King Richard II in the late 14th century. The Hall somehow
managed to survive a disastrous fire of 1834 and is now
used for lying in state of members of the Royal Family. It
is only accessible on guided tours of the Houses of
Parliament*

Eros

Piccadilly Circus, W1

*this famous memorial sstanding in the centre of Piccadilly
Circus was the first aluminium statue and was made in
1893 by Sir Alfred Gilbert. Although known as Eros, the
winged archer of love, it was intended to represent the
Angel of Christian Charity. It was erected as a memorial
to Anthony Ashley Cooper, 7th Earl of Shaftesbury (1801-
85), the philanthropist and social reformer. Disappearing
for some time for much needed repairs it was reinstalled
in1993*

Albert Memorial

*this magnificent monument to Prince Albert, husband of
Queen Victoria, is topped with bronze pillars with
allegorical figures representing astronomy, chemistry,
geology and geometry. Above the top spires stand eight
gilt bronze angels. Tours beyond the railings give you an
opportunity to see the frieze close-up, hear the story and
learn about the restoration work*

Break the Wall of Distrust

*this 1990 sculpture is a doorway of tumbling blocks
topped by a lintel with two flying angels holding a wreath
halo. In front is a faceted crucifix and a standing male
nude with drapes. It is by Zurab Tzereteli, a people's
artist of the former USSR*

*a 1991 metaphor for the 'joyous link between man and
God' this sculpture is by the Swedish artist C W E Milles*
