a collection of preserved modern mammals and their fossil ancestors ranges from whales to bears to shrews

this 36 acre zoo is dedicated to the conservation of, and education, about rare breeds.

there is a bronze statue of the famous bear, Winnie the Pooh, behind the Reptile House. The bear is shown with Lt Harry Colebourn who had a black Canadian bear pet that was left in the care of the Zoo while he served in France during the 1st World War. Colebourn later left the bear to the Zoo where it died in 1934. It became famous after A A Milne named 'Winnie the Pooh' in his famous books after it. The statue was erected in 1992 and is by Bill Epp

another statue has two boys on a bear and was erected in memory of Sigismund Christian Hubert Goetze (1866-1939) an artist who, amongst other works, painted the murals on the staircase of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. It stands at the entrance to the Children's Zoo

the 1997 Bear Mountain (a modification of the original 1914 Maplin Terraces) houses sloth bears that are part of an important conservation and breeding programme. All other bears are now housed at Whipsnade Wild Animal

Kensington Gardens

a fountain erected in 1939 shows two bears wrestling

Paddington Station

Praed Street, W2

transport: Paddington u/g & rail; buses 1,7,15,23,27,36 this railway station is well-known because of the children's author Michael Bond's creation of Paddington Bear. There is a lovely statue on the concourse of Paddington Bear with his floppy hat sitting on a suitcase with a label round his neck saying 'please look after this

bear'. It was erected to acknowledge the pleasure given to children & adults throughout the world since the first book was published in 1958. Designed by Marcus Cornish the statue is from an illustration by Peggy Fortnum.

also on the concourse is a Paddington Bear stall that sells teddy bears, books and other souvenirs about this famous hear

Whipsnade Wild Animal Park

transport: best by car although a Green Line coach runs from Victoria Station during the summer only. Luton & Hemel Hempstead rail station is10 miles from the park

this other half to London Zoo is out in the Bedfordshire countryside and really needs a car for ease of access. With over 2,500 animals it is well worth a visit. Here you will be able to see elephants, giraffes, tigers, rhinos, hippos and brown bears

Tobacco Dock

The Highway, Wapping, E1

built in 1814 this timber and cast-iron framed warehouse was originally a system of wine cellars storing tobacco and wine, then sheepskins & furs. In the 1980s it was being converted into a shopping complex when it went bust and is now a rather deserted place. There are however a few lovely pieces of sculpture dotted about including one of a bear standing upright on hind legs. It commemorates Charles Jamrach (1815-91) an importer and dealer in wild animals who ran an emporium close by

2. Teddy Bears

one of largest collections in the world devoted entirely to the history of children and all aspects of childhood especially toys. Displayed in a wrought-iron building that was originally at the Victoria and Albert Museum in South Kensington. it was established on this site in the 1860s. Besides toys and dolls (Victorian, rag, Barbie) there are exhibits of nursery furniture and child and teenage clothes. And of course a lovely collection of teddy bears

Benjamin Pollock (1856-1937) owned a shop selling toy theatres. The museum was established in 1956 from his collection of toy theatres, mechanical and constructional toys (including a 1907 Meccano set), dolls and pre-1910 teddy bears

this well-known toy and game shop was established in 1760. It has a selection of 40,000 toys on 5 floors. Formerly known as Noah's Ark, it is fascinating for children and adults alike at any time but especially near to Christmas (be warned - it can get very crowded then)

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Important Collections Outside the London Area

The Bear Museum

housed in an Edwardian shop this is Britain's first teddy bear museum with one of the largest collections of teddy bears on public display. Occasionally closed so telephone first to check

Canterbury Heritage Museum, Rupert Gallery

this collection is dedicated to Rupert the Bear

If you want to discover more about Winnie the Pooh then a trip to the **Ashdown Forest** in East Sussex is a must. Here A A Milne lived with his son Christopher Robin and wrote his famous books. It is possible to find Poohsticks Bridge, the Hundred Acre Wood and other locations on 'The Enchanted Places' trail through the forest. Maps are available from this specialist shop housed in a 1690s building

one of the annual events held in the Park is the 'Teddy Bears' Picnic' in August. Children come to enjoy a free picnic in the park but one of the criteria for admittance is that teddy must come too!

Hugglets Festivals

held twice a year (usually February & August) in Kensington Town Hall, Hornton Street, W8 (transport: High Street Kensington u/g; buses 9,10,27,28,49,52, 70,328). Lots of stalls with thousands of bears on sale.

The UK Teddy Bear Guide - published annually by Hugglets, PO Box 290, Brighton, BN2 (telephone: 01273 697974) this book lists shops, bear makers, repairers, museums, clubs etc etc and free tickets to the Hugglets Festivals
