Duck Island is a bird sanctuary with ten types of goose, black and white swans, grebes, shelduck, teal and several other varieties - and even pelicans.

the first pelican was introduced in the late 17th century as a gift from a Russian Ambassador. Over the years many ambassadors have come to see this as a tradition and offer a gift of a pelican, not a native British bird, to St. James's Park. The pelicans are fed every afternoon at 3.00pm near Duck Island Cottage which dates from 1837

Lord Snowdon's free-flight aviary (built 1965) is a tetrahedral aluminium-framed tent that contains 150 different types of bird during the summer. The birds can be seen from an elevated walkway.

this 36 acre (14.5 hectares) zoo dedicated to the conservation of and education about rare breeds has collections of owls, cranes, water birds, pelicans, parrots and tropical and African birds including hornbills, toucans and flamingos. The Penguin Pool has a good collection of penguins that are housed in a pre-stressed concrete structure of 1934 with intersecting spiral ramps. This was the first example of pre-stressed concrete being used for such a structure

the park stretches 26 miles (41.8 kms) on both sides of the River Lee (often spelt 'Lea' on maps) from Ware in Hertfordshire to the River Thames at East India Dock Basin. It covers 10,000 acres of countryside, heritage sites, country parks, nature reserves, lakes & riverside trails, and sports & recreation centres

a good place for birds and birdwatching it is a main wintering area for waterbirds with 10,000 coming regularly especially Tufted Ducks, Pochards, Great Crested Grebes, Coots and Bitterns. There are several good places for watching from hides and three of the main areas are the River Lee Country Park, Chingford Reservoir and Walthamstow Reservoir.
