one of largest collections in the world devoted entirely to the history of children and all aspects of childhood especially toys and includes pedal cars and scooters. Displayed in a wrought-iron building that was originally at the Victoria and Albert Museum in South Kensington. it was established on this site in the 1860s

built in 1825 to house the royal coaches and provide stabling for the horses these Mews, attached to Buckingham Palace, were designed by John Nash

here you can see the coaches used for state occasions including the Irish (used for the State Opening of Parliament) and the Gold State (1762) used for Coronations. A more modern collection of royal cars is also displayed

this local history museum (Borough of Waltham Forest) is the proud owner of Britain's first motor vehicle - the Bremer car of 1894-95

this 1911 column with a medallion portrait of the King shows him flanked by the allegorical figures of Justice & Liberty with cherubs holding a book, a steamer and a motor car. By W S Frith it was a gift of the East End Jews

William Richard Morris, 1st Viscount Nuffield

this 1949 statue is of the car maker and philanthropist Lord Nuffield (1877-1963) who, after making his fortune in car manufacturing in Oxford, founded in 1943 The Nuffield Foundation, one of the largest charitable trusts every established

Michelin Building

the exterior and interior decoration using tyres and motoring murals dates from 1911 (with later additions in 1912 and 1922) and is by the architect Francois Epinasse. The 34 panels depict motoring and aviation heroes and races of the early 1900s. The building was decorated especially for the purpose of advertising Michelin products

Canary Wharf

one of the modern pieces of sculpture to be found dotted around Canary Wharf is the Traffic Light Tree. It stands on the Heron Quay roundabout and is constructed from old traffic lights that change colour from red to green at various intervals. It is supposed to mimic the restlessness of Canary Wharf and its workforce and is by Pierre Vivant

this very popular theme park with many of the attractions made from Lego bricks, has a model village, an assortment of rides including a ghost train, pirate falls,

water slides, driving school & road network, boating school and wave surfer

this motoring and aviation museum was opened in 1991 and stands in 30 acres of the original 1907 racing circuit. Its collection includes over 30 aircraft representing the 80 years of aviation at Brooklands and a refurbished motoring village with historic cars & motorcycles

Brooklands was the 1st motor racing circuit in the world and the ERA Shed houses a speed record exhibition that tells the story of the men and machines that established world records in vehicles developed and tested at the circuit
