St Katharines Dock

transport: Tower Hill u/g, Tower Gateway DLR, Fenchurch Street rail; buses 15,42,78,100; boat Tower Millennium & St Katharine's Piers

the dock was built in the late 1820s by the engineer Thomas Telford. It has old swing bridges, the Ivory House warehouse with cast iron columns and a prominent Clock Tower built by George Aitchison 1858-60

Horse Guards and Parade

facilities: *tours by arrangement; changing of guards daily 11.00 (10.00 Suns)*

opening: unrestricted access to parade ground. Building open on occasional special days. Please phone for details.

clock on tower has black mark by figure. '2' which serves as a reminder of the hour that King Charles I was beheaded at the Banqueting House in 1649

Horniman Museum and Gardens

admission free

a museum built in 1901 to house the varied collection of the tea magnate and member of parliament, John Frederick Horniman (1835-1906). After Horniman had held several highly successful private viewings of his collection he decided to construct his own museum to display it more satisfactorily. He then presented the museum and its contents 'as a gift to the people of London'. It is a fascinating collection ranging from natural history through cultural material to environmental issues and includes an interesting Apostle clock. Outside there is a prominent clock tower

Old Royal Observatory

admission free except to Planetarium

on the exterior of the building is a ball that slides down a mast at exactly 13.00 hours. Occurring since 1833 it enables seamen on the River Thames to set their clocks accurately by Greenwich Mean Time

inside the Observatory the precision clocks are replicas of the 17th century ones made by the horologist John Harrison (1693-1776) for telling the time at sea.

the clock on the outside strikes every hour and the figures of Fortnum and Mason move round it while the Eton School song plays

Little Ben Clock Tower

this model of Big Ben was built 1892

the clock on this famous store depicts St George fighting the dragon. It strikes every hour

this famous store has, above the main entrance, an art deco clock supported by an allegorical figure of the Queen of Time riding on a ship of commerce. It was sculptured by Gilbert Bayes

Houses of Parliament

the world-famous Big Ben clock (1849). Ornate and gilded, the faces are 23ft (7m) across and the copper minute hand of 14ft (4.2m) weighs 2cwts and travels 120 miles each year. The figures are 2ft (0.6m) long and the minute spaces are 1ft square. The pendulum is 14ft 5ins (4.4m) long

the clock is wound and checked 3 times a week and adjusted using old pennies. When the light on top is lit it indicates that Parliament is still sitting. Big Ben is in fact the name of the 13 ton bell that strikes the hour in the clock. It has a unique sound as the bell is cracked

Neal's Yard

Monmouth Street & Shorts Gardens, WC2

transport: Covent Garden & Leicester Square u/g; buses 14,19,24,29,38,176

there is a waterclock on the side of the Wholefood Warehouse. Dated 1982 the water fills a tube showing the minutes. On the hour water from a tank on the top tips a set of cups above a dial each ringing a bell. A row of figures at the bottom tip watering cans and fill a tank behind the shop sign. Inside the tank plastic flowers on floats appear to grow as the water rises. The figure of a

child on the left hand side swings out to water anybody standing below - great fun to watch

No.1 Poultry, EC2

transport: Bank u/g; buses 8,11,26,76,133,242

a 1995 building with mauve and mustard stripes and a clock tower containing a Mappin and Webb clock. A centre well with blue tiling and brightly painted window frames in pink, yellow and blue completes the picture; by James Stirling

Harrow School

facilities: *tours of school by appointment (Mon-Sat 09.30-17.00 - small charge, telephone 020 8423 1524)*

opening: Old Speech Room Gallery daily during termtime except Weds 14.30-17.00

admission free

the 17th century Old School building has crow-stepped gables, bay windows and a clock cupola

Westbourne Grove

junction of Colville Road and Westbourne Grove
Bayswater, W11

transport: Ladbroke Grove & Notting Hill Gate u/g; buses 23,52

these modern toilets have green tiles, a clock and a flower stall!

King's Cross Railway Station, N1

transport: Kings Cross & St Pancras u/g & rail; buses 10, 17,30,45,46,63,73,91,214,259

the 120ft (36.5m) high tower built in 1852 has a clock that was displayed in 1851 Great Exhibition. The clock dials have a diameter of 9ft (2.7m)

Bracken House

Cannon Street, EC4

transport: Mansion House u/g; buses 11,15,26,76,100, 172

over the doorway of this building is a bronze, one metre diameter astronomical clock with a mask face of Sir Winston Churchill in the centre. It was designed by Frank Dobson in 1959

Three Mills Island

facilities: *parking in Tesco car park; Still Café (Mon-Fri 09.30-23.00 (020 8215 3305))*

the Clock Mill dates from 1817 when it replaced an earlier mill. Its Victorian ornate clock tower with octagonal turret, bell & weathervane and the conical caps of drying kilns have established it as a Grade II listed building

Six Public Clocks

'Six Public Clocks' stands as an artwork in Nash Court. It was designed by Konstantin Grcic in 1999

The Archway

facilities: *bar meals Mon-Fri noon-20.00; live bands nightly (21.45-midnight)*

this 1888 pub has ornate corbels, granite columns and a very large clock on the rooftop. There are three bars on the ground floor and Cheeko's night club on the 1st floor. A good place to hear live bands

30 Bow Road, E3

transport: Mile End u/g, Bow Church DLR; buses 8,25, 339,D6,D8,S2

The Minnie Lansbury Memorial Clock is a three -faced clock on wrought iron brackets and frame above a shop at 30 Bow Road. It was erected in memory of the suffragette and daughter of a local Member of Parliament George Lansbury. Lansbury (1859-1940) became a member of parliament in 1910 but resigned two years later to support women's suffrage. Between 1931 and 1935 he was leader of the Labour Party
