the annual Costermongers' Harvest Festival takes place here on the first Sunday in October and has since 1880. These costermongers (Cockney Market Stallholders) are elected as 'royalty' to represent and help their fellow traders. They traditionally wear costumes made of tiny pearl buttons; hence the name Pearly Kings and Queens. The pearls are sewn in various designs such as horseshoe (for luck), anchor (for hope), doves (for peace). The suit may be either smother (mostly buttons and very little cloth showing) or skeleton (fewer buttons)

this costume and textile collection is one of the largest and most comprehensive in the country and the variety of costumes help to illustrate the history of London and its importance in the fashion and clothing industry for over 700 years

Examples of items include a 19th century clown's costume; Georgian Waterman's Coat of 1840 that belonged to Princess Charlotte, the only daughter of King George IV; suffrage banners worn during the fight for the right of women to vote; uniforms of officials of the Church, the Law and the Court

Visitors are encouraged to remain silent and to smell, see and listen to the life of the house and its one-time occupants'

The nickname 'Beefeater' was coined in the 17th century when it was a common term of abuse for a well-fed domestic servant

this annual street carnival takes place over the August Bank holiday weekend (last weekend in the month). Still mainly a West Indian carnival it also includes the Latin American and Asian communities in London. The carnival follows a three-mile route and is famous for its flamboyant costume parades (for children on Sunday, adults on Monday) and its music (steel bands, soca music). Very loud, very busy but very colourful, and great fun if you don't mind crowds and noise. Food is also available in abundance

this home for veterans of the regular army was founded in 1682 by King Charles II. A statue unveiled in to mark the millennium and 300 years of the Hospital, shows an in-pensioner in uniform of the Hospital. In scarlet coat & tricorne hat he raised his stick to salute past comrades while an oak branch symbolises the link with King Charles II who was said to have hidden in an oak tree to escape the Parliamentarians during the English Civil War the uniform of the pensioners dates back to the time of the Duke of Marlborough 1650-1722
