behind the railings of Nos 7-9 is the grave of Giro, the Nazi Ambassador's pet alsatian that died in 1934

## St Mary-at-Lambeth

a stained glass window of a pedlar and his dog. The pedlar gave one acre of land to the church (where County Hall now stands) and is remembered in the window. The church is now part of the Museum of Gardening History

the recumbent tomb of Thomas Byard Clayton (1885-1992), founder of the TocH movement, shows him clothed in padre's robes and holding a prayer book. His feet are resting on a scottie dog

the grave of a family pet dating from 1800 can be found in the gardens above the amphitheatre

## George Gordon, 6th Baron Byron

ring road from Hyde Park Corner to Marble Arch, W1

this statue of 1880 shows the poet Byron (1788-1824) meditating on a rock with his dog Boatswain at his feet. It is by Richard C Belt. The granite used in the sculpture was donated by the Greek government because of Byron's involvement in ther Greek War of Independence against the Turks

#### **Richard Green**

East India Dock Road, E14

transport: All Saints DLR: buses 15,D6,D7,D8

the Green family owned the Blackwall shipyard and were local benefactors. This 1866 statue has Richard Green (1806-63) seated with his dog Hector. The base has scenes of 19<sup>th</sup> century shipbuilding. It is by E W Wyon

# **Windsor Great Park**

it is reputed that the ghost of Herne the Hunter, wearing the black antler of a stag and riding a black stallion at the head of a pack of black hounds, appears in times of trouble. He supposedly gallops through the Park, eventually vanishing into thin air!

# Pet Cemetery, Hyde Park

this private cemetery was built by the Duke of Cambridge in 1880 and between that date and 1967was the burial place of more than 300 beloved animals. Many of the graves have very moving epitaphs. The key to visit is available from the Park Police Station

this museum, attached to the Natural History Museum in South Kensington, opened in 1892 and has a wide collection of animals, reptiles, fish and insects. The section on mammals includes horses, zebra, rhinos, deer, pigs, dolphins and seals - and 88 varieties of dog.

#### **Sir Robert Grosvenor**

Wilton Crescent, SW1

a 1998 bronze statue of Sir Robert Grosvenor, first Marquess of Westminster (1767-1845) shows him with one foot on a signpost stating 'Chester 197miles', reading a map with two talbot dogs next to him. A shield shows two dogs rampant and a gold wheatsheaf. The dogs were added to the arms in the 17th century - used for hunting they are now extinct. The Grosvenor family date back to William the Conqueror when they acquired land in Cheshire. A marriage dowry gave the family the Mayfair district of London and much of the area was developed by the family. Their contribution to London property development is summed up by the quotation by John Ruskin that appears on the monument - 'when we build let us think we build forever'. The statue is by Jonathan Wilder

# Blind Beggar and His Dog

Cranbrook Estate Gardens, west of Regent's Canal, Roman Road,  ${\sf E2}$

a bronze group of 1957, the blind beggar and his dog are figures in local Bethnal Green folklore & legend. The beggar's daughter was courted by four suitors, a knight, a gentleman of fortune, a London merchant and an innkeeper's son. When told they must get the consent of her father, the Blind Beggar, they all left except the knight who asked for her hand. At the wedding the beggar revealed himself as no beggar but Henry, the son and heir of Simon de Montfort

the statue sits on top of eight stepped concrete blocks on which a fountain plays. It is by Elizabeth Frink

## William Hogarth

this bronze statue of 2001 bronze shows the artist with brush and palette and his pug-dog 'Trump'

this charity's motto is 'Rescue, Reunite, Rehabilitate, Rehome' and the Home exists to take in lost and abandoned dogs and cats. Established in 1860 in Holloway, North London it moved to this site in 1871. Here visitors can see how the Home operates and find out about the work of kennel hands, vets, clinics and the team who pick up strays throughout London. You can meet the volunteers who are always needed for walking and petting and learn about the excellent work done

it was at the Home that microchipping of animals and computerised registration systems were pioneered in 1989 and 1993 while during the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War a War Dog School trained stray dogs for RedX work of tracking parachutists, laying wire and carrying ammunition

the greyhound head was the symbol of Thomas Sutton who bought Charterhouse in 1611 and converted it to a charity school for boys and almshouses for gentlemen. The head can be found on the coat of arms, the ends of pews and in the ironwork in the Chapel

# Pan Sculpture

a modern statue dominates the centre of the road through the gate from Knightsbridge into Hyde Park. It is of a man, a woman, a child and a dog fleeing from the Pan and is the last sculpture by Epstein (1959)

this major art gallery has fifteen works by the artist George Stubbs (1724-1800) who is well-known for his paintings of dogs, horses and lions. The engraving of a 'Foxhound' dates from 1788

the 1985 monument to the 'Little Brown Dog' was erected originally as an anti-vivisection memorial in 1906 but was removed in 1910. The inscription gives statistics of animal vivisection in 1903 and 1984. It is by Nicola Hicks and it stands on the woodland walk next to Old English Garden

this collection is considered one of the best in the world for French 18th century paintings, porcelain and furniture. Among the paintings are two by Edwin Landseer (1803-73), the artist best known for his animal work including the four bronze lions at the foot of Nelson's Column in Trafalgar Square. 'The Arab Tent' (1859) shows an arab mare and foal with two greyhounds & two monkeys) and 'Doubtful Crumbs' (1859) has a terrier gazing at the bone guarded by a dozing mastiff

# Sunbeam Weekly and Pilgrim's Pocket

this 1991 statue by Peter McLean shows a bearded man in the costume of a Pilgrim Father looking over the shoulder of a boy reading the comic 'Sunbeam Weekly'. A dog jumps for attention at their feet

this unusual museum displays over 100 dog collars, many of them medieval including one from the 16<sup>th</sup> century with spikes to protect the hunting dog from wildboar attack. Some of the collars can be handled, some have a braille description
