Part of it is will provide the site of the Olympics in 2012

the top of the Arch has Quadriga, a statue of Peace alighting on a chariot of war drawn by four horses with a young boy charioteer. By Captain Adrian Jones,1912, it is the largest bronze statue in England

Sculptured by Charles Sargeant Jagger with a base by Lionel Pearson it honours the dead of South Africa 1899-1902

the symbol of the Inner Temple is Pegasus (the winged horse) and it can be seen on many of the buildings especially the old gateway (1684) and the drainpipes of Middle Temple Hall

outside Temple Church stands a gothic style column similar to the Purbeck columns in the Church. On top is the image of a horse and two riders. It marks the spot where the Great Fire of 1666 was extinguished and the Church saved. The image is taken from the Knights Templar seal and depicts the poverty of the knights who could only afford one horse between them. Erected in 2000 it was designed by Tom Stuart-Smith, with the column by Ptolemy Dean, the sculpture by Nicola Hicks and the inscription by James Honeywood

the largest royal park where you can walk, picnic, jog, swim, fish, sail and horse ride. Horses and riding equipment can be hired from Hyde Park Riding Stables (Summer Tue-Fri 07.15-18.30, Sat-Sun 08.30-17.00; Winter Tue-Sat 07.15-sunset, Sun 08.30-sunset; Mons private lessons; group or private rides).
a bridle path called 'Rotten Row' circumnavigates the park for 5 miles (8 km). It originally linked Westminster Palace and Kensington Palace and was the first public road to be lit by 300 oil lamps. These were put up by King William III to light the walk from St James's Palace to Kensington Palace as thieves and footpads made it a dangerous place after dark
by the side of the Row you can see a horse trough of 1892 that was taken from Victoria Embankment and presented to the Household Cavalry Regiment in memory of the horses killed and injured in the IRA terrorist attack in Hyde Park in 1982
