this 36 acre zoo dedicated to the conservation of and education about rare breeds has collections of pelicans, penguins, water birds, owls, cranes, parrots and tropical & African birds. Lord Snowdon's free-flight aviary (built 1965) is a tetrahedral aluminium-framed tent that contains 150 different types of bird during the summer. The birds can be seen from an elevated walkway

Brompton Oratory (Oratory of St Philip Neri)

built between 1880 and 1884 this was the first new Catholic church in London after the Reformation. It has the third widest nave in Britain after Westminster Abbey & York Minster and is of High Baroque (Italian Mannerist) style with side aisles decorated with gold, Siena marble & Venetian mosaics. A carved pelican can be found on the wooden tabernacle door near the altar of St Wilfrid.

The Oratory is well-known for its music and solemn masses sung in Latin
