one of largest collections in the world devoted entirely to the history of children and all aspects of childhood especially toys. Displayed in a wrought-iron building that was originally at the Victoria and Albert Museum in South Kensington. it was established on this site in the 1860s. Besides toys and dolls (Victorian, rag, Barbie) there are exhibits of nursery furniture and child and teenage clothes. And of course a lovely collection of teddy bears

Inside you may be able to spot a gramophone,vintage wine, vintage cars, original paintings, leatherbound editions of books by Rudyard Kipling & G K Chesterton and a French travelling set of dolls' clothes made in 1938 for the wife of King George V
