these magnificent cast bronze entry doors each weigh 1.5 tons and are engraved with various London scenes. The handles are columns surmounted with a lion and unicorn while the plates are shields. They are the work of James Woodford (1893-1976)

this fascinating museum traces the development of Britain's might as a sea power from King Henry VIII's Tudor fleet through voyages of discovery to 20th century naval warfare in the Falklands and the Gulf. On the outside of King William building, in high relief round an oval window, are a winged lion (on the left side) and a unicorn (on the right). Below are two dolphins and foliage. Four cherubs representing the four winds and other sea and marine symbols complete the decoration
